## Internship Programme @ Anubhuti

Anubhuti has always been a great place to study as well as gain experience (as the name suggests). From 2019 onwards Anubhuti has come up with this interesting concept of Internship for the students at the Jain Irrigation Systems Limited (our parent company). We are familiar with the importance of internships; they provide first-hand exposure to working in a corporate, facilitate the development of new skills, and enhance resumes through relevant skills and experiences. In May a group of 16 students participated in this Internship. They worked at different sectors such as Marketing, Designing etc. at the Company and gained a wide knowledge of the same. I thought I had missed the great opportunity of the same due to a couple of Medical Entrance examinations. But I knew the day was not long when I would get an opportunity again. After a request to school management I was permitted a 15 days long Internship and to my amazement my dream sector-Biotechnology. From the 13<sup>th</sup> of June, I started with my work experience.

This internship was a merger of two of my passions – science and writing. Under the guidance of Dr B.K and Mr Atul Patil, my first day kicked off with me gaining knowledge in the Virology Field where first I was briefed about the techniques of Enzyme-Linked Immunosorbent Assay (ELISA) and DNA Isolation

protocol. The following week I was entitled to perform the tests on Various Potato and Banana Viruses. This included grinding the sample with Liquid Nitrogen (-1960C) followed by many chemical reactions to obtain the results. For the next few days, I also learnt and performed RNA Isolation techniques, Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) and Agarose Gel Electrophoresis. Then for the last three days, I went to the Microbiology Section where I worked with Dr Prachi where we performed many experiments with plant viruses. Here I learnt how to infect plants and prepare a suitable chemical to destroy the infection.

At the end of my Internship, I was required to prepare a report and submit it to my Head In-Charge Dr B.K. After proper guidance on my report and taking along a rich diverse knowledge I was given with my Internship Certificate.

Overall, the internship provided me with an opportunity to keep abreast the latest happenings in my field of interest-Biotechnology. I learnt to communicate with a diverse audience keeping the gist of the subject intact. A lot of reading and research being involved in the job, I enhanced my conceptual knowledge. Regular discussions with my mentor regarding my progress accelerated suggestions and constructive criticism.

The program included a couple of dances from Mongolia (The Mongol Biyelgee), China (rose dance) and Turkey (Zeybek). This was followed by a mesmerizing performance by an Indonesian boy with a puppet which is called Wayang.

Then the time came when we had to bid goodbye to our newly made Japanese friends. As the event concluded there were tears in the eyes of most of the students. We realized that we had not only built a rapport but also a strong bonding with each-other. The following
