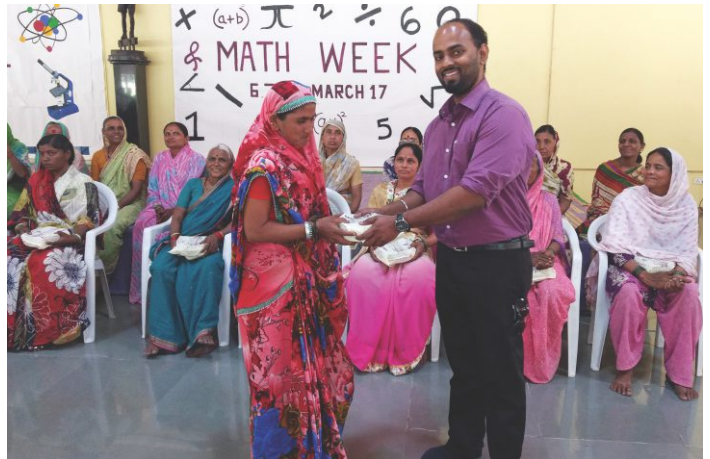
Saluting The Real Architects

The next day was celebrated as Mathematics Day with a presentation on the Importance of Mathematics by Gangadher Sir, a faculty at Anubhuti. This was followed by a Mathematics Quiz in the afternoon which was attended by all the students.

On the third day five schools of Jalgaon, participated in the programme. As the theme this year was 'Sustainable Development' and we had invited students from various schools to participate in this exhibition. We had some exquisite models which inspired us to take a step to prevent our nature from deterioration. The jury members judging the competition were Dr. Anil Dhake and Dr. Bhardwaj. As the host school we did not participate in the competition but had prepared a model of a driverless car.

Incidentally, March 8th is celebrated as International Women's Day, and the function was blended along with the International Women's Day Celebrations. Dr Gauri Rane, Head of the Department of Botany, M J College graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. She shared all her scientific works and contributions during her long tenure and enlightened the audience with rich inputs in her address. Following the speech, all the schools displayed their models on the theme "TECHNOLOGY FOR SUSTAINABLE FUTURE" and gave their Power Point Presentation.



In the latter half of the day the students of Anubhuti presented their scientific experiments and models, which attracted large scale interest and enthusiasm. In the competition Podar International School walked away with the Winner trophy, followed by Anubhuti English Medium School being declared the RUNNER up team. The students of Anubhuti School were rewarded for their innovative and creative experiments.
